

WHY WHEAT

WHEAT...

- is the world's most important food crop
- provides 20% of all calories and 20% of all protein in developing and developed countries
- is the most traded crop

BUT...

- wheat production is not meeting demand
- yields are stagnating
- demand is predicted to increase by 60% by 2050
- to meet this demand, global annual yield increases must rise from the current level of 1% per year to 1.6% per year by 2050.

All wheat producing countries share an urgent need to increase the rate of genetic gains for yield, tolerance to abiotic stresses, resistance to pathogens and pests, as well as to improve efficiency for sustainable wheat production, while ensuring high quality, safe and nutritious food products.





THE WHEAT INITIATIVE

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- provides a framework to establish and coordinate strategic research and organisation priorities for wheat research at the international level in both developed and developing countries.
- establishes and fosters communication between the research community, funders and global policy makers, and aims at securing efficient and long-term investments to meet wheat research and development goals.
- identifies, through its Expert Working Groups (EWG)
 research priorities and potential synergies, and nurtures
 collaborations between research and development
 programmes for wheat improvement.
